Rural, Unserved, Underserved

Oregon Office of Rural Health Geographic Definitions

Rural as any geographic areas in Oregon ten or more miles from the centroid of a population center of 40,000 people or more.

Frontier as any county with six or fewer people per square mile. ORH has identified 10 of Oregon's 36 counties as frontier. More information can be found at the bottom of this page.

ORH uses population numbers from the <u>Population Research Center at Portland State University</u> for incorporated cities and counties, and numbers from Claritas for Oregon Zip Codes.

Using 2024 Claritas data, 33% (1,403,688) of Oregon's population lives in rural areas, 2% (97,666) in frontier, and 65% (2,772,488) in urban areas.

Understanding "Unserved" and "Underserved":

Unserved:


Locations that lack access to broadband internet service at speeds of at least 25 Mbps download and 3 Mbps upload.

Underserved:

Locations that have access to broadband internet, but not at the minimum speeds considered sufficient for modern usage, typically defined as 100 Mbps download and 20 Mbps upload.



BEAD – Grants Based on SD Areas



- 1,300 Locations of 4100 Certified; waiting on LOC decrease verification process to complete
- Next 3-4 deployments covering ~2,000 locations underway, in various stages of work

Current ACP Data:

- 1400 Current ACP Benefit Customers
- ACP Benefit Amount is \$30 per month
- End Date of ACP Benefit: April 2024
- April is last fully funded month.



Customer Communication

- Emailed/Mailed CM in January alerting of benefit wind down
- Email/Mailed in March alerting CM of last invoice date for ACP benefit & to apply for Lifeline Benefit
- Banner on website alerting CM
